JANUARY

Certificate of Commendation Presentation – 17 Janu-Camp Commander Roger Leturno and Past Camp Commander Jay Rarick presented Fort Belvoir Firemen Jerry Jett Jr and Jon Card SUVCW Certificates of Commendation before their peers and leadership, in recog-

nition of their selfless act on Memorial Day 2016.

These two firemen arrived at White Oak Primitive Baptist Church Cemetery in their dress uniform and placed GAR markers, flowers and American flags on the graves of three Union soldiers. "This might be the first Memorial Day that these guys have gotten," Card said. "They've laid here for about 153 years, and have never been recognized, as far as I know. So it's just important to take 10 minutes and come down say thank you."

Fireman Card stumbled upon these graves while exploring White Oak. He immediately cleaned the site, uncovering two other graves in the process. Card said, "It really upset me. As an Army veteran, it's important to me that no soldier lie buried with a bunch of leaves and trash. That's just not appropriate."

The white headstone marks the assumed final resting place of Peter Vanderhoof, 15th New Jersey Infantry Regiment. The other two graves are unmarked. Card, himself a New Jersey native, didn't consider this discovery a coincidence. Vanderhoof's regiment came from around Card's hometown and many of the unit's dead are buried in the local cemetery. Card said, "Of all the Regiments and units that it could have been, it was from home."

Firemen Jett, who has ancestors buried in White Oak, was touched by his friend's idea to honor these neglected soldiers and together they performed this Memorial Day ceremony in tribute to civil war soldiers.

The preceding article was submitted by the Camp and included in the SUVCW magazine, *The Banner*.

Patriotic Instructor Public Presentation - 28 January

Camp Patriotic Instructor (CPI) Ross H. Schwalm delivered a presentation entitled "Faith, Family and Brothers in Arms at Second Manassas 1862" at Ner Shalom Synagogue in Woodbridge, VA. CPI Schwalm conducted research and presented information on his Civil War Ancestors in the 48th, 50th, 57th and 96th Pennsylvania Infantry Regiments as well as Jewish soldiers of the North and South. CPI Schwalm highlighted the original opposition to Jewish Rabbis becoming Chaplains in the US Army as well as how Jewish soldiers acquitted themselves for both armies in the war. CPI Schwalm was able to pin point a Jewish soldier named Ellis Strouss who served in the 57th PA who worked his way up the ranks to Captain and commander of a company in the same regiment. George Clark, a distant relative of CPI Schwalm's wife's family also served in the 57th PA.

7th Lincoln Dinner, Fredericksburg VA - 11 February.

Grant Griffiths, the Great Great Grandson of Lieutenant General Ulysses S Grant, visited the US Army Ordnance Training & Heritage Center's WWI Gallery. With a very prestigious military ancestry, Brother. Griffiths has a deep interest in American military history and commented "I've been a student of military history my entire life."

Brother Griffiths' Mother, Edith Grant, was the oldest daughter of Ulysses S. Grant III; his Father, David Wood Griffiths, graduated from West Point in 1918 and retired on March 31, 1950 at the rank of Colonel; his Grandfather, Ulysses S Grant III, graduated West Point in 1903 and retired at the rank of Major General in 1945; his Great Grandfather Frederick Dent Grant died while commanding

Governor's Island at the rank of Major General and his Great Great Grandfather, Lieutenant General Ulysses S Grant, led Union the Armies which defeated Confederate General Robert E Lee effectively ending the Civil War in 1865.



Brother Griffiths was born in Little Rock, Arkansas and moved around the country following his Father's military career. Mr. Griffiths worked at Fort Lee from 1981-1987 in the Directorate of Engineering and Housing. In 1987 he moved to Fredericksburg and worked at the U.S. Marine Corps Air and Ground Museum as a curator until his retirement in 1998 after 35 years in the federal government.

New Castle's Separation Day Parade New Castle, DE - 10 June . On June 15, 1776 the Assembly of the Three Lower Counties (Delaware) meeting in the Assembly Room in the New Castle Court House, acted on the advice of the Second Continental Congress, approving a Separation Resolution. Under this document, anyone holding office, military or civilian, in the colony would thereafter be doing so in the name of the government of the Counties of New Castle, Kent and Sussex Upon Delaware, and not the King of England. This cut all ties that Delaware had with the British crown, and since the three counties had originally been part of Pennsylvania by royal charter, it also cut the few remaining ties that Delaware had with that government.


The parade kicked off at 1100 A.M on a warm, soon to be hot, Saturday morning. Other units participating in the parade were: 3rd USCT Reenactment Unit, 26th Pennsylvania SVR, 97th Pennsylvania, Antietam Camp #3, Antietam Camp #3 Auxiliary, Appomattox Camp #2, Bradbury Camp #149, Garfield Camp #1, Philadelphia GAR Post #2 and Torbert Camp #1862.

Manassas Battlefield Walking Tour, 26 August. In conjunction with the Johannes Schwalm Historical Association (JSHA), Irish Brigade Camp Brother and JSHA Historian Ross Schwalm conducted a walking tour at the Manassas National Battlefield Park to sites related to his family's service in the Union Army at the Battle of 2nd Manassas. By a quirk of fate, both Ross and his wife, Carol, had relatives in four different Pennsylvania Regiments who fought in this pivotal battle in Aug 1862. The tour included visits to Matthew's Hill and the Unfinished Railroad. Brother Schwalm also coordinated with NPS for a Ranger talk on the Union Breakthrough. A Social Hour was held at the conclusion of the tour.

SEPTEMBER

10th Annual Yankees in Falmouth/Conway House – 9 & 10 September. Once again Camp members participated in the popular annual living history event in old-town Falmouth. The Camp set up a recruiting and information tent and display for visitors. The event interprets the Union

Antietam Battlefield Staff Ride - 14 September. Camp members and guests visited and toured the Antietam Battlefield in Sharpsburg, MD, just days short of the 155th anniversary of the battle. With ~22,720 casualties (~3,650 dead) Antietam ranks to this day as the single bloodiest day in American history. Perhaps the most strategically and politically important outcome of the battle was that it

gave Abraham Lincoln the victory he needed to publish the preliminary Emancipation Proclamation, forever changing the nature of the conflict. After a day taking an in-depth look at the battles of South Mountain and Antietam, the Camp and guests had a lite dinner and refreshing adult beverages at the Bavarian Inn just across the Potomac River in nearby Shepherdstown, WV.

OCTOBER

Battle of Cedar Creek Reenactment 14 & 15 October. Brother James Standard reprised his impressionist portray-



al as Major General Sheridan with brothers Brian Withrow and future Brother Gary Carlberg also supporting this event on the grounds of the 1864 battle near Middletown, VA. At

about 4:00 p.m. on Saturday October 14 what allegedly was a bomb was found in the Sutler's Village (vendor exhibit area). Law Enforcement officials evacuated the entire Sutler Village and Confederate encampment area and conducted a search of the immediate area with bomb dogs. Since Gary has several years of experience searching for bombs in Iraq and Afghanistan, he supported the ATF and FBI and visually cleared three parking lots. He found a suspicious package and alerted the ATF. A Bomb Technician with dog were dispatched and they carefully cleared the package. With an appropriate regard to safety, the Cedar Creek Battlefield Foundation cancelled Sunday's spectator events. On Sunday, the reenactors held a ceremony as a show of resolve. Before the start of the reenactment, both sides approached and shook hands. The Confederate Army played "The Star-Spangled Banner," and the Union Army played "Dixie." At the end both sides then sang together "USA, USA."

NOVEMBER

Remembrance Day, Gettysburg Pennsylvania - 18 November. Several Camp Brothers participated in the annual commemoration ceremonies and parade sponsored by the Sons of Veterans Reserve (SVR) honoring President Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. On the heels of the package bomb incident at the Cedar Creek Reenactment, the 61st Annual Remembrance Day Parade went on despite an anonymous 'credible' threats made in a letter to the Gettysburg Times. Despite the potential of danger on many people's minds and a chilling downpour of rain, units of reenactors and impressionists proudly marched alongside clusters of police and strategically placed traffic barricades. Fortunately, the day's events occurred without incident. Brother candidate Gary Carlberg was the Color Sergeant at the rededication of the urn that memorializes the contributions of the Minnesota soldiers buried in Gettysburg National Cemetery. The urn was the first monument on the Gettysburg Battlefield in the cemetery and was erected 150 years ago.

DECEMBER

Middletown Virginia Christmas Parade – 3 December

Commander Roger Leturno, Brother James Standard and his wife Wendy, Brother Brian Withrow and Brother candidate Gary Carlberg participated in the Middletown Christmas Parade as members of the joint SVR and Army of the Potomac color guard. For three consecutive years,

Wreath-laying at Irish Brigade Monument, Fredericksburg Virginia - 10 December. The Irish Brigade Camp No. 4 of Fredericksburg, VA was pleased to attend the annual wreath laying at the City Dock in Fredericksburg, VA on the Sunday closest to the anniversary of the Battle of Fredericksburg (13 Dec 1862). In City Docks Park rests a monument where the Irish Brigade bivouacked prior to the battle 155 years ago. This monument reminds us of the exemplary courage shown by the Irish Brigade, and, indeed every Union soldier who charged Marye's Heights that day. We joined with the 28th Massachusetts Vol. Inf., Co. B, and the Ancient Order of Hibernians in honoring the men of the Irish Brigade. Our special guest was Brother Mark Day, National Commander-in-Chief (C-in-C) of



the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW). Camp Commander Roger Leturno and SUVCW CinC Mark Day laid a wreath at the monument. Following the wreath laying, NPS Ranger Frank O'Reilly led his traditional walking tour "In the steps of the Irish Brigade". Wreaths Across America, New Bern National Cemetery, New Bern NC - 16 December. Patriotic Instructor Ross Schwalm was the key note speaker covering the 2017 theme "I am an American. Yes, I am." The event was attended by over 2000 guests including American Legion posts, Legion Riders, local politicians, Daughters of the American Revolution, Boy and Cub Scouts and active duty and reserve military units. The cemetery is near the site of the Civil War battle of New Bern and Brother Schwalm's Great Grandfather John P. Kessler, 48th Pennsylvania Infantry participated in this battle. The leadership efforts of Mr. Ken Dimpsey, US Navy veteran, the community purchased over 5700 wreaths covering nearly every headstone in this cemetery.

1862 was a year filled with the sobering realization that the tragedy of civil war would be more costly in blood and treasure then ever though; for us 155 years later, 2017 beheld an event filled and successful year of commemoration for our Camp within the backdrop of an emotionally charged and contentious national debate on a number of subjects. As evidenced in this publication, Camp Brothers participated in a large number and variety of events that were both enriching to members and educational to the public, but also encountered some of the moments of social distress. But as Commander Leturno reminded us in an email before Thanksgiving, "On this special day we must not forget to count all our blessings that God has bestowed upon. It's the perfect time to be grateful for the millions of things that we are blessed with and forget about what we do not have. In a year of political turbulence, it has been easy to lose track of the multiple blessings in our lives family, friends, good health, friendships and colleagues. I appreciate more than ever the enduring strength of the Constitution and democratic norms; the ongoing determination of the American people to form a more perfect union; the goodwill of those citizens who, regardless of party, fight injustice and tyranny; and our magnificent military, which protects us from harm and defends our liberties. America remains the last, best hope for the world." Accordingly, Irish Brigade Camp #4 of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War Camp added to membership and discharged our fraternal chartered purpose of preserving history and commemorating the service of Union Veterans of the Civil War. The Brotherhood perseveres and will resume the mission to honor our ancestors in 2018 and beyond.
